Isaiah 42:20, “*Seeing many things, but thou observest not; opening the ears, but he heareth not.*”

Psalms 119:18, “*Open thou mine eyes, that I may behold wondrous things out of thy law.*”

Our eyes are used to see and perceive the world about us. In a figurative way, the term “eyes” is used to describe understanding. In the passage in Isaiah 42:20, Isaiah was talking about how that people see many things, but yet they do not see.

I can’t help but think of the world about us. People are able to see basically everything this world and beyond has to offer. There is almost no place on Earth to which we cannot travel visually. Any old movie, or TV show, can instantly be seen online. Any book or information is almost certainly available as well. We can see news and events unfolding about us with the technology of today.

Certainly the Bible, the word of God, is as easily accessible. It’s available on our phones, tablets, and computers. Most every translation and language you can imagine is available online. Yet, as

Isaiah said, people are seeing many things but observing not.

It’s not that the word of God is unavailable, it’s everywhere. People are simply refusing to look at it either from lack of interest or refusal to accept the Bible. Certainly there are those who do not have as easy access to the Bible as we do. It’s up to us to help them see and understand the word of God.

Before we can help others, we need to have a knowledge of God’s word ourselves. The writer in Psalm 119:18 said, “*Open mine eyes, that I may behold.*” Two of the pronouns refer to the writer— “mine” and “I.” I need to have a knowledge of God’s word myself to help those who are not seeing.

We certainly are not going to know all there is to know in the Bible. It seems every time I read, I see something I’ve never seen before. Certainly I’ve read the words before, but it seems with time there is more understanding. No doubt the LORD opens our minds and hearts as we study and pray for understanding. We also learn how different passages tie together the more we study.

The last part of the verse in Psalm 119:18 says, “*That I may behold wondrous things out of thy law.*” There are so many passages that fill us with wonder and bring such peace to us. They tell us about Heaven and the glories there. They tell us about Heaven being a place of no pain and forever being with the LORD and going to be with our people. The more I read and study, the more I anticipate going to be with the LORD.

We want others to have these feelings of peace and hope as well. They can never have those feelings until they too see and understand the word of God. Whether it’s within our own homes or around the world, as opportunity presents itself, let’s help open the eyes of others to the wondrous things of the word of God.
